

Modern Life, Modern Art University of Alberta, Augustana Campus

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Course Description: This 200-level course examines the development of modern life and modern art in the 19th and early-20th centuries. We will focus on modern life in Britain, which had a strong influence across the world due to the expansive reach of the British Empire, as well as select developments in other countries such as France and Germany. Using hands-on, experiential learning, students will explore the visual and material culture of modern life as it developed in these European imperial centres; consider the ways that artists and designers responded to their changing visual and material environments; and reflect on the legacies of modern life and modern art in our 21st-century lives.

Course Objectives: This course focuses on developing skills in **critical reflection** while engaging in hands-on activities and crafting practices, including collage, embroidery, making rag rugs, and quilting. Students will NOT be assessed on the quality of their crafts, but rather on their ability to synthesize scholarly arguments with personal experience in critical reflections.

By the end of the term, students will be able to...

- Explain the meanings of the key terms "modernity" and "modernism" and the relationship between them;
- Identify and discuss components of scholarly arguments presented in course readings;
- Apply scholarly arguments while reflecting on personal experiences with materials and crafting activities (demonstrated through critical reflection assignments); and
- Find primary sources using library databases.

- 2 critical reflections (on Crafting Thaumatropes & Exploring Modern Print Media)
- Midterm Project: Collage and Critical Reflection
- Final Project: Textile Craft (rag rug or crazy quilt) and Critical Reflection
